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Advent	Advent is the start of the Christian year and is the four-week period before Christmas. Advent begins on the Sunday nearest to 30th November and lasts until midnight on Christmas Eve. During Advent, Christians across the world prepare for the celebration of the arrival of the Lord into the world through the birth of his Son, Jesus Christ. The beginning of Advent is when preparations for Christmas begin – festive food, gifts chosen and wrapped, carols sung, cards are written and posted, and houses decorated
Christmas	Every year in December we celebrate the birthday of Jesus Christ. That is why we call this time of year 'Christmas' - we celebrate the 'Mass', or church service, for Christ. Christmas is a truly magical season, bringing families and friends together to share the much loved customs and traditions which have been around for centuries. Most people are on holiday in the UK and stay at home with their family on Christmas day, 25th December, the main day for Christmas celebrations in Britain.
Lent	Lent is the 40-day period before Easter beginning with Ash Wednesday. In the past it was a long, strict religious fast when people gave up all rich food. The day before Lent starts is known as Shrove Tuesday. Lent is the time when Christians prepare for the greatest of the Christian festivals known as Easter, by thinking of things they have done wrong. The Christian church no longer imposes a strict fast. Lent is a time when some Christians try to overcome their own faults because they believe that it was man's sin which led Jesus to be crucified. Some Christians try to follow the example of Jesus in the desert by giving up luxuries and practising self-discipline. And they try to put aside more time to prayer and religious acts so that they can really let God into their lives
Shrove Tuesday	In the UK, Shrove Tuesday is also known as Pancake Day because it is the one day of the year when almost everyone eats a pancake. Shrove Tuesday is the last day before the period which Christians call Lent. Lent is a time of abstinence, of giving things up. So Shrove Tuesday is the last chance to indulge yourself, and to use up the foods that aren't allowed in Lent. Pancakes are eaten on this day because they contain fat, butter and eggs which were forbidden during Lent.
Ash Wednesday	Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of six and a half weeks of repentance, fasting and abstinence in preparation for Easter. For Christians, ashes are a symbol of being sorry for things they have done wrong and want to get rid of forever. The marking on the forehead with ash marks the commitment to Jesus Christ and God. They wanted to show God that they were sorry for the wrong things they had done in the past year. Many Christians will attend a religious service where the ashes are blessed by the church leader, and placed on their forehead
Mothering Sunday	Mothering Sunday is a time when children pay respect to their Mothers. Children often give their Mothers a gift and a card. Mothering Sunday is always the fourth Sunday of Lent. It was a day in Lent when the fasting rules were relaxed, in honour of the 'Feeding of the Five Thousand', a story in the Christian Bible. Maids and servants were only allowed one day to visit their family each year. This was usually on Mothering Sunday. For some this could be a significant journey since their mother may have lived some distance away. Often the housekeeper or cook would allow the maids to bake a Simnel cake to take home for their mother.
Easter	Easter is the season in which Christians remember the death and resurrection of Jesus. It is the most important festival in the Christian year. Jesus' resurrection is at the centre of the Christian faith. Jesus died for the sins of humanity and by coming back to life promises eternal life for all those who believe in him. Easter is the story of Jesus' last days in Jerusalem before the death of Jesus. The Easter story includes: Palm Sunday This is the Sunday before Easter. Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey. Christians receive palm crosses and may process around the church. Maundy Thursday Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Easter. Good Friday Good Friday commemorates the death of Jesus. Easter Sunday This is the most important date in the Church Year, when Christians celebrate Jesus' resurrection from dead.
Harvest	Harvest Festival is a celebration of the food grown on the land. In Britain, we have given thanks for successful harvests since pagan times. We celebrate this day by singing, praying and decorating our churches with baskets of fruit and food in a festival known as 'Harvest Festival', usually during the month of September. Harvest Festival reminds Christians of all the good things God gives them. This makes them want to share with others who are not so fortunate. People bring food from home to a Harvest Festival Service. After the service, the food that has been put on display is usually made into parcels and given to people in need.
