


This week, our school council has been busy decorating two Christmas trees and planting daffodil bulbs around the school grounds. They are hoping to plant more bulbs and seeds to add more colour to our school grounds in the spring/summer months.

Miss Mulroy has been working with Simon Perry from the village to create a plan for improving our



woodland area. If there is anything that you can see that you can help us with, please do let us know.



- Specific suggestions:

 1. Clear litter from the area. Try to maintain it as a 'natural' area with materials' resources cleared away

 1. Clear litter from the area. Try to maintain it as a 'natural' area with materials' resources cleared away. after sessions (with a store perhaps just outside the area?). Ropes can be removed but if needed leave string (e.g. jute) stall which will break so it not a hazard) over high branches to allow rope to be easily re-attached and removed as required.
- 2. Consider planting a mixed native hedge just outside or inside the entrance fence, to screen the area and provide a greater diversity of woody species. Order from the Woodland Trust now for late spring planting.
- Monitor the ash trees alongside the boundary to the churchyard. Cut back/reduce by which could hide any safety issues if ash die back disease appears
- There are a few self-sown ash in the 'ditch' alongside the churchyard boundary. Consider further hedging here.
- Construct a log circle; logs available from Tregony Sports Field and from Simon.
- Cut up some of the wood lying around to make habitat piles.
- Consider cutting steps along the boundary path or level the soil to make access easier. Particularly when it is very wet some areas will become very worn and slippery.

 8. There is some elder growing through from the roadside boundary. Allow elder to spread and plant
- more of this fast growing and useful shrub.

 9. Monitor growth of self-sown sycamore. Cut back/ coppice as needed and use the wood.

 10. Plant plug plants (and/or sow seed) of woodland species onto the steep slope; e.g. campion, primrose,

- garlic mustard etc.

 11. Encourage clematis (old man's beard) to grow across from the roadside to form a tunnel for the path to go through.
- 12. Plant evergreen shelter either against the fence or in line with the four oaks to line the pathway. Use for example privet (which is already present on site) or perhaps a non-native fast growing evergreen like Olearia (New Zealand plant grown widely as shelter belt in Cornwall' Scilly).

 13. The four oaks are too close together to all grow into mature trees and as consequence some are not growing as well, Monitor and consider removing one or two in the future?
- 14. Plant up the top of the slope at this point with Forest School useful trees! shrubs from which wo
- be harvested in the future by coppicing. Dogwood, willow, hazel, elder etc.

 15. Monitor central ash for ash dieback and if necessary replace with another tree, perhaps something
- different which would grow here and is not so susceptible to disease e.g. sweet chestnut 16. Consider planting some spring bulbs e.g. daffodil, snowdrop, bluebell in areas which will not be trampled as much
- 17. Construct, position and monitor use of animal homes. A few bird boxes, possibly but boxes on the pines, hedgehog hibernation box/boxes, minibeast refuges including a larger minibeast hotel.
