

## Friday 9th October

## Dear Parents/Carers,

On Thursday, I had the pleasure of carrying out learning walks across the school. I am so proud to report that in every class children were happy, focused and engaged with their learning. They were keen to talk to me about their topics and show me their work. Not only that, but, their beautiful manners were an absolute highlight from the very youngest to our Year sixes. Their conduct and following of both old and new rules made me so immensely proud of them - we really are a very fortunate school, filled with lovely children. It is so very hard to believe that many of them had not, until September, been in the school environment for over six months and our youngest pupils had no transition from pre-school and yet they have more than coped! Whilst I cannot fail to acknowledge that some children may have been anxious about a return to our new normal and are perhaps still settling, our wonderful pupils have shown and are demonstrating true resilience at a time when we are filled with arim stories about the impact this pandemic has had on them and may well continue to have. We need to remain positive rather than set them up with this media driven prophecy. There is work to do and learning gaps to close, but, together, with your help, we can address these. Whilst on the topic of Covid, and with the significant rise in cases, please can I ask that you check your emails, our website and our Facebook page frequently so that, should we need to inform you of a school closure whilst out of school hours, you receive the information in a timely fashion by accessing one of these communication platforms.

In Towan class, we have been looking at different parts of a flower and the purpose of each part. All children have had a challenge of making a flower and labeling it. During child initiated play this week, the children have been interested in worms and building superhero dens. TheYear 1s especially enjoyed this week's English as they loved innovating the story of `Farmer Duck`.

In Summers Class this week the children have been writing about their walk around Tregony. Following on from this, they have been looking at the similarities and differences between London and Tregony. They realised that both places have a clock tower and a monument, but that Tregony does not have a zoo or a palace!

This week, Porthcurnick class have been writing their own versions of Stone Age Boy, and, in French they have been learning to say how they feel and ask how someone else is feeling by using the phrase ca va. In science, they completed a rock survey by looking at the rocks that the school has been made from. They found out that the school has mostly been made using different man-made rocks (including glass as it's made from sand).

The children in Portholland Class have been producing some amazing models of prisons for their homework for the Crime and Punishment topic. They have also really enjoyed looking at the movement of the Suffragettes and the changes that have occurred throughout history because of them.

This week, the year 6s in Porthluney Class have worked incredibly hard and have mastered long division. It was something that they were all worried about, but the practise was worth it - they are all very proud of themselves. We have also been playing matches in hockey and have been showing off all of the skills that we have learnt during this half term.

Next week, our Year 6 pupils are catching up on the Bikeability sessions that they missed during the summer term last year. Pupils have received a letter regarding their dates and the equipment needed so please check this for dates and times.



Last week, I emailed information regarding the nasal flu vaccine. All children in Primary Schools from **Reception to year 6 (inclusive)** will be offered the vaccine. The vaccination is free and recommended for young children; it is administered by a quick and simple spray up the nose. Please enter <u>www.nhs.uk/child-flu</u> to access information explaining the vaccination programme which also includes details about the small number of children for whom the nasal vaccine is not appropriate. They are due to visit our school on **Tuesday 24**<sup>th</sup> **November 2020**. In order to access the online consent form, please enter or click on the following link

Please submit your consent form by Friday 20<sup>th</sup> November 2020 to ensure your child receives their vaccination. If you experience any problems accessing the form please telephone 01872 221105 and the team will be



happy to help. Please note that as in previous years **you must opt in** to the programme. If a consent form is not submitted your child will not be vaccinated. For your information, the children's health screening services will be paused for the time being but hope to resume next year.

Please can all children ensure that they bring their reading record book, reading book and home reading book (if they have one) each day. Reading books are changed each Monday and Friday and there will be an opportunity to change library books each Monday for KS2 children and Friday for KS1. Unfortunately, we are only able to change books on these days due to the need for them to be quarantined between use. We ask that children read at least four times a week and that their reading record book is signed. Thank you
